

Current ANS program protocol (2011)

All watercraft including inflatables with more than one chamber are required to have current 2011 permit.
All single chambered craft are required to stay with in the swim area.

All watercraft are required to have inspection to launch on Boulder Reservoir and must launch from the south shore.

Incoming Water craft:

- Current intact Boulder reservoir green tag with matching receipt Standard inspection \$0
- Current intact Boulder reservoir green tag **without** matching receipt High risk inspection \$35
- All other location green tags High risk inspection \$35
- No tag High Risk Inspection \$35
- Any inspection may lead to need for decontamination if craft is not clean, drained, and dry or has suspect items on craft and/or trailer.

Require Decontamination if:

- Fail high risk inspection (boat is not clean, drained and dry or suspect ANS is found)
- Coming from a infested or suspect water with in Colorado:
 - Pueblo
 - Grande lake
 - Granby
 - Shadow Mountain
 - Willow Creek
 - Tarryall
 - Jumbo
 - Blue Mesa - Suspect
- Visited an out of state water in last 30 days

Boulder Reservoir now has a Decontamination station on site.

Decontaminations are done by appointment.

Fee will be determined upon completion of decontamination based on complexity of boat and amount of associated equipment

Decontamination Type:

| | <u>Fees</u> |
|--|------------------|
| Standing water decontamination | \$35 |
| Simple water craft-(john boat no compartments) | \$65 |
| Intermediate watercraft (no ballast tanks) | \$75 |
| Complex (ballast tanks, showers, etc) | \$95 |
| Non Boulder Reservoir permit holder's | 2x amount listed |
| Suspect watercraft | \$150 |

*** When dealing with a suspect boat, decontamination will be done then boat is required to sit for maximum of 7 days pending sampling results.**

• **LIVE BAIT REGULATIONS:**

1. Live aquatic bait is prohibited west of the Continental Divide, except at Navajo Reservoir, and east of the Continental Divide above 7,000 feet.
2. In areas where live bait is allowed, boaters must show a receipt that the bait was purchased within seven days of use from a Colorado commercial bait dealer, or else their bait will be transferred, using a net, to a clean container and their live well decontaminated.

• **LIVE BAIT RECOMMENDATIONS:**

1. Anglers should not collect and transfer live bait from a reservoir where mussel larvae have been found.
2. Anglers using live bait should always minimize the transfer of water with bait between reservoirs. Netting bait and transferring to a clean container with distilled water will minimize risks of ANS transfer.

Failure to: Cooperate with inspection protocol,
Cooperate with staff requests and/or
Treat staff with respect

May lead to denial of access to launch watercraft or revocation of boating privileges.

Definition of Terms:

Clean - Absent visible ANS, attached vegetation, dirt, debris or surface deposits including mussel shells or residue on the watercraft, trailer, outdrive or equipment that could mask the presence of attached mussels.

Drained -All water drained from any live-well, bait-well, storage compartment, bilge area, engine compartment, floor, ballast tank, water storage and delivery system, cooler or other water area of the watercraft, trailer, engine or equipment.

Dry - No visible sign of any standing water on or in the watercraft, trailer, engine or equipment

Suspect watercraft - any watercraft that is identified by an inspector as having any material suspected to be aquatic nuisance species
